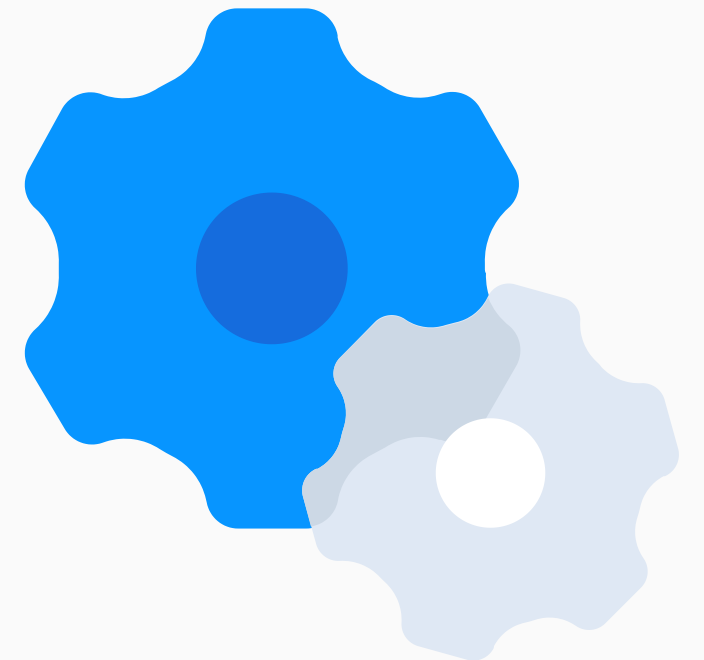

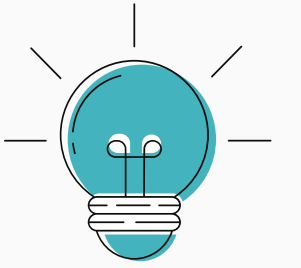

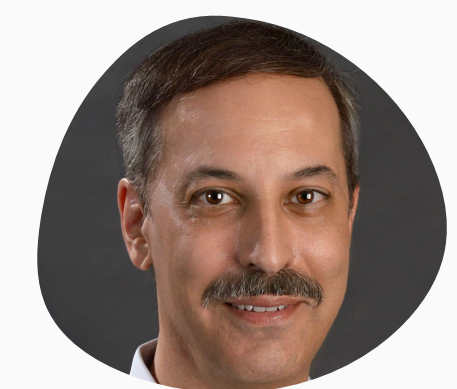
**Adiaha Spinks-Franklin, MD, MPH,** (pronounced /ah \* dee \* YAH/)

Dr. Adiaha Spinks-Franklin is a board certified Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrician at Texas Children's Hospital and Associate Professor of Pediatrics for Baylor College of Medicine. She serves on the Executive Committee of the Section of Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics for the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). She is an inaugural co-chair of the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee for the Society of Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrics, where she formerly served on the Board of Directors and as Co-Chair of the Advocacy Committee. She is Founder of the pediatric anti-racism social justice organization called "Race and Children Educational Collaborative of Anti-Racist Developmental-Behavioral Professionals (RACE CARD)". She participates in global pediatric healthcare projects in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, and South America. Dr. Spinks-Franklin is a married mother of three adult sons and three adorable grandchildren. She and her husband live on a farm.



**E'leyna Garcia, PhD**

Dr. E'leyna Garcia is a postdoctoral fellow in the Department of Pediatrics, Psychology Section, at Texas Children's Hospital/Baylor College of Medicine. She primarily works in the Traumatic Stress & Resilience Clinic, which provides trauma and grief clinical services for youth and families in outpatient and foster care settings. Dr. Garcia additionally conducts research on topics including posttraumatic stress, suicidal ideation, and sleep problems in BIPOC youth. Dr. Garcia earned a bachelor's degree from Guilford College in Greensboro, North Carolina, graduating with high honors. She then earned her PhD at Howard University in Washington, DC. Dr. Garcia completed her clinical internship at the University of California, San Francisco School of Medicine Multicultural Clinical Training Program.



**David Schonfeld, MD, FAAP**

Dr. Schonfeld established and directs the National Center for School Crisis and Bereavement ([www.schoolcrisiscenter.org](http://www.schoolcrisiscenter.org)), located at Children's Hospital Los Angeles. He is Professor of Clinical Pediatrics at Keck School of Medicine. For over 30 years, he has provided consultation and training to schools on supporting students and staff at times of crisis and loss in the aftermath of numerous school crisis events and disasters within the United States and abroad, including the COVID-19 pandemic (2020); terrorist attacks of the World Trade Center (2001); school and community shootings and stabbings in Santa Clarita, CA (2019); Parkland, FL (2018); Newtown, CT (2012); among many others. Dr. Schonfeld frequently speaks on the topics of crisis and loss and has authored more than 150 scholarly articles, book chapters, and books. He has conducted school-based research (funded by NICHD, NIMH, NIDA, the Maternal and Child Health Bureau, William T Grant Foundation, and other foundations) involving children's understanding of and adjustment to serious illness and death and school-based interventions to promote adjustment and risk prevention. Dr. Schonfeld is a member of the Executive Committee of the American Academy of Pediatrics Council on Children and Disasters and the National Advisory Committee on Children and Disasters. He served as a Commissioner for both the National Commission on Children and Disasters and the Sandy Hook Advisory Commission in CT and was a member of the National Biodefense Science Board. He served as President of the Society for Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics from 2006-7.
